Featured Monthly Contest Winner: Macro

Ross Ellet shares his hard-won knowledge on producing stellar supermacro snowflake images.





Sometimes the most ordinary and common subjects can create unique photo opportunities. Each winter in the Great Lakes region, the cold, cloudy, and gloomy weather gives way to lake-effect snow flurries. Those snowflakes are a little bigger than the average snowflake, and can be full of interesting fernlike shapes or dendrites. Under a macro lens, with some light and patience, you can freeze a frosty moment in time.

Snowflake photography is best when the wind is light or calm. It doesn't take much for a snowflake to blow away or break up into pieces! The temperature should be around 28 degrees or lower, and I generally shoot most of my shots when the temperature is between 10 and 25 degrees. There are as many ways to photograph snowflakes as there are snowflake types, but I generally put a dark blue or black sock hat outside to collect snowflakes. The soft dark surface serves two purposes: first, it provides a soft landing for the snowflake and increases the chance it stays intact; and second, the background provides high contrast for the snowflake to pop more in photographs.

Snowflakes are incredibly tiny, and having a dedicated macro lens with 1:1 magnification or greater is best. I use a Laowa 25mm f/2.8 2.5-5X Ultra Macro lens, and also put a ring light on my camera for extra light on the subject. Often you can get colorful refractions in the snowflake by angling the ring light in different directions. The f-stop is around f/4 to f/6.3, and the shutter speed is at least 1/180 of a second, but I try to be at 1/300 of a second or faster if possible to limit blurriness. I put the camera on continuous shooting and carefully adjust the focus (by moving the camera back and forth), getting every sliver of the snowflake in focus. These images are focus stacked in Photoshop to get the end result.

This is a great way to turn a depressing weather and photography day into gold. For those interested in trying this for the coming winter, I highly recommend getting the ebook "Sky Crystals" By Don Komarechka. That book expands greatly on the shooting and editing process. --Ross Ellet
