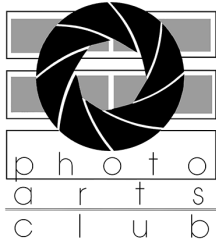

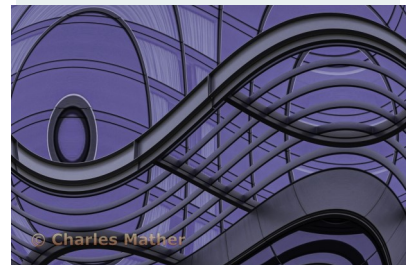

### PACT Education Night – April 14, 2022

#### On Safari in South Africa and Botswana

Please join me on April 14, 2022 for the PACT Education Night as I share my experiences on Safari. I have chosen several events that stand out in my mind and will walk you through the events as they happened. We'll discuss equipment used and camera setting to get the shots. But I also want to share some of those photos that didn't make the cut as "technically" acceptable but document what happens when you least expect it in the wild. I want to give you the opportunity to experience it by asking questions at any point along the way. We'll travel through The Kruger, one of the largest game reserves in South Africa. Our next stop will be Sabi Sands where I spent 4 days exploring the Idube Private Game reserve. At this location we had a personal Spotter and Ranger and were able to go "off road" for a more up-close encounter. From there we will travel to the Chobe River in Kasane, Botswana and the Okavango Delta where we will stay in a tented camp within the Great Plains Conservation. All in all, this was my bucket list dream vacation. I was on safari for 26 days and these experiences touched my soul as no other place ever has. I hope you will join me.



## Street Photography

### Descriptions of Street Photography:

**From Jack Myers for our monthly contest**—A genre of photography that records everyday life in a public place. The very publicness of the setting enables the photographer to take candid pictures of a stranger, often without their knowledge. A street photograph is a real, unposed moment.

A similar description comes from James Maher—Street Photography is candidly photographing life and human nature showing surroundings and how people relate to it. It doesn't have to be urban . It can even be a family barbecue if not posed or manipulated. It should include people and their culture.

Tips: Find a location and wait and photograph in your own area.

Tips from Imagineate.com

- Since there are often a lot of items in this kind of photography, use leading lines, curves, and natural shapes to guide the viewers' eyes.
- Catch reflections.
- Wait for an important moment.
- Try shooting in black and white if colors might be distracting.
- Choose the lens that is most comfortable for you. We will also include recommendations.
- Balance too long a lens with one that will get in too close.

To capture the human eye perspective, use a 50mm or 35mm prime. Most street photographers use these while other use a 16-35mm or 24-70mm. All are fast lenses.

They list the best lenses for the following cameras:

Nikon 35mm f 1.8G

Cannon EF 35mm f 1.4L

Sony FE 50mm f 1.8

## Street Photography (continued)

- Shoot in Aperture Priority .

There is no time to change settings when capturing people in a scene. This allows you to concentrate on focus. Auto ISO is also a good option for the same reason.

**“If you miss the moment, you miss it forever.”**

They don't recommend that you shoot at the fastest aperture. “It is not a good idea to obliterate whatever there is in the background.” The background is there to give perspective so you don't want to eliminate that. An image can be blurry if you use a narrow depth of field because even the slightest movement can effect the focus.

### Legalities of Street Photography

If you travel **internationally**, the most important thing to remember is that each country has their own laws and regulations. **Check before you go.** There is a YouTube video on street photography in other countries. <https://www.youtube.com/watch?v=YEPJ3-jOjCQ&t=439s>

Some countries are similar to ours. Quoted in Expert Photography. Metropolitan Police of England and Wales for example state:

“Members of the public and the media do not need a permit to film or photograph in public places. “

I have included what is easy to find on the internet for our country but it is not a legal perspective. The First Amendment ensures a right to freely express yourself. Street photographers have the right to take pictures in public places but not in private places. If a person has an expectation of privacy, photography may not be allowed. Examples include doctors' offices, restrooms and AA meetings. There are gray areas however. Some parks, etc. which look like public spaces may be privately owned and as such pictures are not permitted without permission.

Crime scenes are off limits as well as military bases and courthouses. Public pavements and highways are areas that can be photographed as long as it doesn't block access or could be a safety concern. Some states have additional laws.

Use Model release forms if you're photographing for commercial photography.

‘Photography has a commercial purpose if the intent is to sell or advertise a product.’ This does not apply if you are planning to sell the photograph. “Their work is still considered artistic rather than commercial.”
